

As the Vancouver Warriors embark on their inaugural season in the National Lacrosse League, there are many who are hopeful that this finally may be the perfect marriage between an organization that knows how to put on a show and the game that we have all loved in this region for so long.

BC has always been a hotbed for Canada's official sport of summer; lacrosse. With origins running deep with First Nations and the Western Lacrosse Association plus numerous leagues, organizations and programs, the river of talent is deep and wide and can be seen throughout not just BC but right across most any league of lacrosse, box or field, in the world.

Lacrosse has deep roots in BC, but why hasn't there been success at the NLL level?

Enter Canucks Sports and Entertainment. In June of 2018, the Canucks purchased the Vancouver Stealth and have done two major things right off the hop: 1 - Changed the name of the franchise to the Vancouver Warriors and 2 - Brought lacrosse back to downtown Vancouver.

In addition, the Warriors have brought in experienced lacrosse personnel with roots to BC Lacrosse. Long-time New Westminster Salmonbellies General Manager Dan Richardson now heads up a Warriors team that by no accident has a Head Coach Chris Gill and the rest of the management team have their hands full with trying to put together a formula for success here in Vancouver. Part of that formula will include putting BC players in a position to succeed here with the Warriors.

Richardson: "We know that there are plenty of players who live and play here in BC who for one reason or another have not had their shot to succeed in the NLL. Identifying these players and giving them an opportunity, plus drafting well and making key acquisitions, will help establish our team and give us a great chance for success."

As important a piece for the Warriors on the floor is their ability to generate excitement off the floor; enter Canucks Sports and Entertainment, who have been front and centre as one of the premier entertainment companies in North America for years. With 41 regular season Canucks games plus pre and playoff games already in their stable, Rogers Arena is also one of the busiest concert venues in North America, bringing in most if not all the elite shows that the world has to offer. CSE believes that one of these elite shows is the National Lacrosse League and have signed on to provide the backing to a franchise that has never had this depth of experience in the past.

"The goal of any event that we bring into Rogers Arena is to deliver a first-class,

roster that is almost entirely made up of players who call BC home for 12 months of the year.

"When I was asked to lead this team, we established five pillars that we wanted our team and our fans to identify us by; RESPECT, INTEGRITY, HARD WORK, COMMUNITY AND CHARACTER" stated Richardson. "These are not just key fundamentals for success in lacrosse, but also success in life. We know that by putting these keys in place that over time our team will see the results that we are expecting."

With only two wins in 2018, and none on the home floor in Langley, Richardson,

amazing fan experience to our guests," explains Chief Operating Officer Trent Carroll. "Having the Vancouver Warriors as part of our family provides us with an excellent opportunity to do so in a different way than we do with the Canucks or other events."

David Comuzzi, the Warriors Senior Director of Business Operations, knows that the experience in the building is just as important as the success on the floor. "Our goal is to entertain our fans from the moment that they arrive at Rogers Arena until the moment they depart," says Comuzzi. "Theme nights, giveaways, fireworks, the Bud Zone, autographs, value food and beverage...all of these items tie into the success of this organization. They all tie into a bow and allow us to bring an experience to our fans that will have them leave the building wanting to come back."

With a theme night every game, autographs on the floor, great food and beverage deals and more, the only thing missing from a good night being a great night was location. Enter Rogers Arena. Lacrosse is back downtown, and Canucks Sports and Entertainment sees that as a key cog to the success of the Warriors as well.

"Being back in downtown Vancouver gives everyone in the Lower Mainland, and BC for that matter, an opportunity to experience our games," says Comuzzi.

McIntosh Named BCLA's Mr. Lacrosse

The BC Lacrosse Association's 2018 selection for BCLA's most prestigious award, the Tom Gordon plaque, was longtime fan, referee and volunteer, Port Coquitlam's Gord McIntosh.

The Tom Gordon Plaque is BCLA's highest honour for "Mr. or Ms. Lacrosse" for the outstanding achievement of an individual -- an honour one cannot claim as theirs without commending the efforts of others. The Tom Gordon Shield is one of BCLA's original merit awards dating back to 1969.

"Being nominated for the Tom Gordon plaque is an honor and I am still not sure it is fully deserved -- winning it is very humbling," said Gord McIntosh. "I have seen the names on the plaque of all the past winners and I know and have looked up to so many of them, which tells me that I have been around lacrosse for quite a while."

Gord has been involved in lacrosse since the age of 13. He has played, reffed, coached and been involved in different levels of executives locally in his home town with the Port Coquitlam Minor Lacrosse Association. More recently, he has served with the BC Lacrosse Association on the Minor Directorate as Chair.

McIntosh joins some great lacrosse company in being a recipient of the Tom Gordon Plaque.

Ironically, and fittingly, the gold statute trophies merit awards recipients receive are named after a highly regarded lacrosse advocate and past Tom Gordon recipient, Gord's late father, Gary McIntosh.

"What I find particularly satisfying is knowing that my dad won this award in 1987 and 1994 and how proud I was of him when he won. We were very proud of him and the messages I got from my own kids when I got home were very similar. Having my sister, Shannon, sitting at the table with me was a special memory."

Gord's commitment to lacrosse has not gone unnoticed as he was the recipient of the 2002 Jimmy Gunn Senior Referee of the Year Award and the Leon Hall Box Association of the Year Award...now he can add the Tom Gordon plaque as "Mr. Lacrosse" to his mantle.

1968 Salmonbellies called to BC Sports Hall of Fame

The BC Sports Hall of Fame announced the 2019 induction class November 14, 2018 at BC Place Stadium. The banner class included the likes of hockey's Sedin brothers, former Whitecaps coach, Tony Waiters, Detroit Red Wings GM, Ken Holland and the 1968 New Westminster Salmonbellies world champion team.

In 1968 and 1969, the Western and Eastern Lacrosse Leagues formed a semi-professional league called the National Lacrosse Association (NLA).

The Eastern Division included the Detroit Olympics, Montreal Canadians, Peterborough Lakers and the Toronto Maple Leafs – while the Western Division was comprised of the Portland Adanacs, Vancouver Carlings, Victoria Shamrocks and New Westmin-

final and then went on to beat Portland in six games to represent the west in the NLA finals.

The NLA Championship was played in New Westminster against the heavily favored Detroit Olympics, coached by the legendary Jim Bishop. The Salmonbellies won the World Championship in six games.

Poco's Dickson Eyes WILC 2019

This time, age will be not be a determining factor in Curtis Dickson's chances of making Team Canada.

In 2008, Dickson was just above the age threshold, too old to play for his country as Canada hosted the 2008 Federation of International Lacrosse (FIL) U19 World Lacrosse Championship.

Dickson had celebrated his 20th birthday earlier that summer, rendering him ineligible for that team and forcing him to be a spectator as the best U19 players battled for world supremacy.

Making things even more difficult, the championships were played in Coquitlam, a short drive away from Port Coquitlam, his hometown.

The world is once again coming to the Lower Mainland this time in the form of the 2019 Federation of International Lacrosse (FIL) World Indoor Lacrosse Championship.

The 20-country event runs September 19 to 28 at Langley Events Centre with Canada gunning for a fifth consecutive gold medal at the quadrennial competition.

And Dickson would love nothing more than to wear the Maple Leaf, something he had

done on three previous occasions to great success, winning a pair of gold medals (2014 field lacrosse, 2015 box lacrosse) and a silver medal (2018, field lacrosse).

Missing out on making the team more than a decade ago may have been a disappointment at that time, but Dickson has responded quite nicely, carving out a phenomenal professional career in the National Lacrosse League, with 360 goals and 641 points in 138 career NLL games, all with the Calgary Roughnecks.

Dickson's play earned has already presented him with three opportunities to play on the sport's biggest stage, winning a pair of gold medals and one silver.

"It is a special moment to represent your country and hear your (national) anthem," Dickson said. "That is what everyone is there for, to play for their country (so) it is a pretty special experience."

Dickson's past international experiences have taken him to Denver, Colorado (2014), Syracuse, New York (2015) and Netanya, Israel (2018). The first and last of those competitions were field lacrosse while the other was indoor. Inside an arena or on an open field, for Dickson it is all about representing his country in the sport he loves.

"You get to play with a lot of guys you are usually playing against, meet new people and travel to some pretty cool places," Dickson said.

But playing for Canada – on home soil and just a half hour or so from home – would be another amazing opportunity.

Langley Events Centre is also a venue Dickson is quite familiar with. In 10 career NLL games with Calgary against the Vancouver Stealth, Dickson potted 34 goals and 32 assists for 66 points, a hefty 6.6 points per game average. And in another five games as a visitor to LEC with the Maple Ridge Burrards of the Western Lacrosse Association, Dickson has tallied 11 goals and 19 points.

"The Langley Events Centre is a great venue. I think it is a perfect size for an event like this," Dickson said.

"There is nothing quite like representing your country and I have been fortunate to do it three times now," he said. "But this would be my first chance to play at home for Canada. It would be pretty cool to get the opportunity to play in front of the home crowd and so close to home."

Dickson's parents were able to travel to watch their son play for Canada in 2014 in Denver, but they were unable to watch attend either in 2015 or 2018.

"If I am fortunate enough to be chosen for this team, it would be pretty special to have so many family and friends nearby and able to watch with it being just down the road," he said.

BC's Best Junior Players Selected at 2018 NLL Draft

Among those selections is the 2018 BCJALL Top Scorer in the Victoria Shamrocks' Braylon Lumb, who went 55th overall. Lumb showed he can perform in all situations and developed leaps and bounds over the last two seasons when he was relied upon. The Warriors took five players from BC in total.

Two more BC players are headed to San Diego to join the Seals in the inaugural year. Graydon Bradley was another deadline add by the Adanacs en route to the Minto and brings a big physical presence coming out of the back gate. Zac Christianson is also a reliable defender.

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BCJALL 2019 Season Preview

The BCJALL is setting up to be one of the most competitive seasons in recent memory. Not only has Coquitlam's Minto Cup title raised the standards for other teams, but teams are responding, striving to build a team that can match the best BC and Ontario can offer.

Teams like New Westminster, Langley and Victoria are primed for a potential run for the provincial title by building deep, balanced rosters that can put the ball in the net and play solid defense. Other clubs like Port Coquitlam and Burnaby are building promising programs by giving young players opportunities to immediately contribute while investing heavily in the BCJALL Midget Draft. Nanaimo and Delta also showed signs of turning things around last year, and will draw on a quality minor feeder systems to continue building momentum.

So here's how we see it going into the 2019 campaign.

Burnaby Lakers

2018 Season: 2-18-1 (Missed Playoffs) Predicted 2019 Finish: 7th

The Lakers' two wins last season wasn't a true indicator of their talent. Burnaby struggled in the scoring department by netting the fewest goals for (156) with a total goal differential of -90. They scored at a 28% clip on the power play, which was amongst the worst in the league.

The addition of one of the game's most prolific scorers as head coach could change things. Hall of Famer, Russ Heard, accepted the role after the departure of Jason Dallavalle. If there's any place Heard will be able to help the most, it's in the goal scoring department.

Returning goaltender, Matteo Tack, showed a lot of promise with solid numbers despite a 1-5 record. He turned aside 297 shots in 459 minutes of work and a .814 save percentage. He may have to battle for the crease with new acquisition Diesel De Guzman, acquired in an off-season trade from Port Coquitlam. Ryan Johannson was the second overall pick in the 2017 draft and will surely improve on a 14 point season.

The club still has a long way to go, but things appear to be on the upswing at Bill Copeland Arena.



Coquitlam Adanacs 2018 Season: 18-2-1 (BCJALL Champions) Projected 2019 Finish: 1st

Adding another Minto Cup to the cabinet raises expectations once again for the A's despite looking invincible en route to a National Championship. It's a team that's used to it and will be the runaway favourites to claim another BC title.

Coquitlam have one of the best talent bases to draw from but are still the most forward-thinking team when it comes to player acquisition. Having Christian Del

Bianco in net definitely doesn't hurt, but trades like the transfer of Chase Scanlan from Ontario and adding Ryland Rees, Dylan Foulds and Graydon Bradley in a last-minute deadline deal with the Saints helped this team get over the top.

Look no further than Luca Antongiovanni as an example of the depth that developed through the Adanac system. The youngest player on the roster shone during the playoffs after a call-up from Midget A1 and contributed in the transition game at the Minto Cup.

Replacing Del Bianco will also be no easy feat, but the Adanacs are confident backup Nate Faccin can step up to the plate. Delta Islanders

2018 Season: 6-14 (Missed Playoffs) Projected 2019 Finish: 5th

Kyle Goundrey's staff look to turn things back around in a big way for the Islanders. After finishing the 2018 season with only two more wins than the 2017 campaign, 2019 looks a lot brighter.

The cupboard was pretty bare when he took over the Islanders' after an exciting provincial championship win and Minto Cup appearance in 2017. Goundrey is building it back up with assistance from Hall of Famer Andy Ogilvie. Ogilvie's presence paid immediate dividends on defense. They will need to develop what they have in the system now as their Minto run left them with only a handful of draft picks over the last two seasons.

That means the pressure is on former NLL goaltender and new General Manager, Matt Disher, to put together a competitive team, but you can bet he will be up to the task.

While 83 points in 21 regular season games was one of the highest in the BCJALL, it was in the playoffs where he shone brightest. Malcom played some of his best lacrosse in the Coquitlam series and scored more than a few highlight reel goals.

The 'Bellies lost plenty to graduation, but none more so than losing all-star goaltender, Erik Kratz. Kratz finished off an excellent career and earned a tryout with the NLL's San Diego Seals. Keegan Melenychuk only appeared in 134 minutes over the regular season and playoffs but looked good in goal with limited action. He could be an option moving forward, but knowing New West's past history, you can't rule out the team recruiting a goalie.

Three BC teams took home titles as the Claremont Spartans Senior team took the Elite division championship; Royal Bay Juniors won the High School Division (9 & 10th grades); and the Ridge Meadows Burrards were crowned Tournament (3 & 4th grades) champs.

Claremont Senior team went a perfect 6-0 outscoring their opponents 57-19 at the Space Needle Shootout. The 53rd Annual Awards Ceremony and Gala dinner is set for Wednesday, March 13, 2019 at the Fairmont Pacific Rim. The ceremonies will recognize BC's best in amateur sport including athletes, coaches, and officials for outstanding performances in their sport over the 2018 season.

Each finalist was nominated by their Provincial or Multi-Sport Organization, High School, College or University. The Selection Committee, chaired by Bernie Pascall, included 15 highly regarded sportswriters, broadcasters, and amateur sport leaders in British Columbia.

"Each year the Athlete of the Year Awards selection committee reviews all nominations and recognizes the talented and deserving athletes, coaches and officials", notes President & CEO of Sport BC, Rob Newman. "The nominees for the 2019 Sport BC Athlete of the Year Awards represent 25 sports and 16 various cities who are all representative of the strength and depth of sport development in our province over the last 53 years. Each year, we are grateful for the support and contribution of our sport and business partners and volunteers."

"It's no secret, BC boasts many of the top athletes in Canada, we reviewed an impressive list of candidates for awards consideration." says selection committee chairman Bernie Pascall. This well-balanced team scored 248 goals, with only two players in the top 20 league scoring. The league's stingiest defense, headed by league Top Goaltender and All-Star, Christian Del Bianco, only allowed 131 goals against (6.24 goals per game) in 21 regular season games.

Head Coach, Pat Coyle's, Adanac team finished the regular season in first place atop the BCJALL, entered the playoffs as the top seed and swept the Victoria Shamrocks 3-0 in the semi-finals. In the BCJALL Provincial finals, the A's found themselves down 2 games to 1 in the best-of-seven finals to the New Westminster Salmonbellies. Coquitlam rattled off three straight wins, outscoring New Westminster 36-13 the rest of the way, to capture the BCJALL title 4 games to 2 and a spot in the 2018 Minto Cup National Championships.

The Coquitlam Adanacs won their third Minto Cup in 2018, 3 games to 1, over Ontario's Brampton Excelsiors. The A's finished the 2018 campaign with 32 wins, 6 losses and a tie. This title marked Coquitlam's second Minto Cup in three years. The Adanacs are the first western Canadian lacrosse team to win multiple national titles since the Burnaby Lakers (1998-2005). The 2018 Minto Cup title was Pat Coyle's second as Head Coach.

Dave Huntley Posthumously Honoured with Lester B. Pearson Award

OTTAWA, ON – The Canadian Lacrosse Association (CLA) is proud to announce

that the late Dave Huntley, a man who dedicated his life to growing the sport of lacrosse and the Canadian national team program, has been selected as this year's recipient of the Lester B. Pearson Award, one of the highest honours bestowed by this country's lacrosse community.

The Lester B. Pearson Award, which has been handed out 22 times since its

creation in 1973, is presented by the CLA to an individual in recognition of their unselfish dedication and outstanding contributions of sportsmanship and distinguished leadership to the game of lacrosse and to the physical and mental development of young Canadians.

Over the past four decades, Huntley, a native of Toronto, Ont., was a driving force behind the evolution of field lacrosse in Canada and the growth of the game - at the grassroots, high school, collegiate and professional levels throughout North America. He was involved with the Canadian senior men's field lacrosse team at every FIL World Championship since 1978, helping shape the

> national team program into an international powerhouse that has since captured three world titles.

Huntley suited up as a player twice, bringing home gold in 1978 and bronze in 1982; roamed the sidelines as a coach from 1986 to 2010, winning gold on home soil in London, Ont. in 2006; and was the team's general manager in 2014, responsible for selecting the

coaches and players that would help win the country's most recent gold medal.

"Hunts is the perfect recipient of the Lester B. Pearson Award," said Randy Mearns, head coach of the Canadian men's field lacrosse team. "He was one of the most influential, upstanding, intellectual and selfless individuals I have ever met. He transcended the game with heart, passion, honesty and an eagerness to be involved in your life. He nurtured and thrived on meaningful relationships and dared to dream big."

Huntley grew up playing box lacrosse but found his true calling in the field game. He was a standout midfielder at John Hopkins University, helping the Blue Jays capture the NCAA Division I national championship in 1978 and 1979. He was named a three time All-American and took home the McLaughlin Award as the nation's top midfielder during his senior season.

His tremendous technical knowledge of the game and his player-first coaching style helped him craft a successful career behind the bench and on the sidelines. He spent 10 seasons with a handful of National Lacrosse League franchises and coached Major League Lacrosse for eight seasons, capturing league titles with Baltimore in 2005 and Toronto in 2009. He also coached with Loyola University and the nationally ranked Calvert Hall High School in Maryland.

While his personal accomplishments and accolades were numerous, Huntley will be most remembered for his good character and kind-hearted nature. He was a well-respected man who was extremely passionate about the game of lacrosse and cared deeply about the people that were involved with it.

"If you were around Dave his passion for lacrosse was obvious, but his ability to connect with people was unique," said Ed Comeau, general manager of the Canadian men's indoor team, in an interview with NLL.com from January 2018. "Dave's insight and assessment on player's talent, drive and character was second to none. He challenged the way we looked at lacrosse and sought out new and improved ways to play."

In winning the Lester B. Pearson Award, Huntley joins a group of distinguished past winners that includes fellow 1978 world championship gold medalist Stan Cockerton (2011) and a pair of volunteers that worked alongside him with the national team, Terry Lloyd (2015) and Stew Begg (2008).

"Despite only meeting him in person once, I was able to learn a lot about the kind of person Dave Huntley was through conversations with our national team coaches and athletes, and by reading the countless tributes and stories about him shared following his passing," said Alain Brouillette, former Marketing and Communications coordinator with the CLA. "It became clear that he embodied exactly what this award stands for, so I decided to put his nomination forward."

This is not the first time that Huntley's contributions to the sport have been recognized.

He was inducted into both the Canadian Lacrosse Hall of Fame and the US National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 2011 and was also one of 55 members of the Canadian lacrosse community to receive a Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal back in 2012.

Huntley was also posthumously awarded the Spirit of Lacrosse Award, which is presented to

"Everyone who knew Dave personally always knew where they stood with him," said Snider, a face-off specialist who played on national teams coached or manager by Huntley since 2006. "He knew what you needed to hear, whether it was positive or negative, and his delivery was always direct and on time."

"Hunts gave his time to more people than I could ever understand," added Snider. "His dedication to others, especially those he cared about, is unrivalled. He contributed immensely to the growth of lacrosse in North America and to the lives of so many of our sport's young leaders, many of whom will look to carry on his legacy."

Despite his sudden passing in December 2017 at age 61, Huntley remained a key figure in the national team's journey to the podium at this summer's World Championship in Israel.

His number 18 jersey, along with those of late national team goaltenders Kyle Miller (#35) and Chris Sanderson (#17), was showcased on Canada's sideline during each game. This subtle tribute not only helped honour a man whose legacy runs deep within the global lacrosse community, it served as a reminder to those suiting for Canada that they were playing for a group of men who dedicated their lives to the sport.

Additionally, in August 2018, Major League Lacrosse inaugurated the David Huntley Man of the Year Award, which is presented to the lacrosse athlete who has demonstrated "sportsmanship and professionalism that are beyond reproach" and who "makes selfless, meaningful contributions to Major League Lacrosse, the game of lacrosse, and to his community."

Huntley was a teacher, mentor and had a positive impact on so many people in the lacrosse community. His legacy will continue to live on through the players, coaches and administrators that had the privilege of learning from him over the years, a list that includes longtime national team midfielder Geoff Snider. While the team did not achieve its ultimate goal - losing in heartbreaking fashion to the U.S. in the gold medal game - they played the entire tournament with passion and tremendous character, something that their long-time mentor would have surely been proud of.

With his team's loss still fresh on his mind, coach Mearns summed up the reciprocal impact his friend had on Canadian high-performance lacrosse with a few powerful words.

"The national team program meant the world to Dave Huntley," he said. "His passing was a big loss, a real tough loss. Dave meant everything to this program."

"We all miss him dearly, I know I certainly do."

Lacrosse Leads Burnaby Sports Hall of Fame Class

Two lacrosse greats and a lacrosse pioneer developer will be inducted into the Burnaby Sports Hall of Fame along with three other individuals and a team.

The 2018 induction class is headed by soccer's Bruce Wilson, the captain of Canada's only FIFA World Cup soccer squad who

played with and against some of the game's greats. ATHLETE – Alex Carey, Lacrosse. Carey learned his lacrosse in East Burnaby before playing junior for the Mount Pleasant Legion 177 which won the Minto Cup, Canada's national junior championship, in 1956. He was on two Vancouver Carlings/Burrards Mann Cup championship teams in 1961 and 1964 missing out on the 1963 Mann Cup because of injury. Carey accumulated 228 goals, 251 assists for 480 points in 334 regular season games in the Western Lacrosse Association with the final six years playing for the Coquitlam Adanacs. Carey had another 84 points, including 38 goals in 81 post-season games for a career total of 564 points.



Eric Cowieson, Lacrosse. Cowieson cut his lacrosse teeth at the Confederation Park box in North Burnaby, a hotbed for talent in the 1960s, winning several minor championships with Norburn. He played in three Minto Cups in the four years he played junior for Burnaby Cablevision, winning in his final year of

1977. Cowieson played 18 years — including being captain for 14 seasons — with the New Westminster Salmonbellies winning the Mann Cup four times. Despite being known primarily as a defensive player, Cowieson managed to score at a clip of 1.65 points per game in his career.

BUILDER – George Pittendrigh, Lacrosse. Pittendrigh was first introduced to lacrosse in 1908 and he ended up introducing the sport for many a decade to many a young boy as a coach, organizer and executive member of South Burnaby minor lacrosse. Besides all those duties, his commitment to the sport extended to even clearing land on the vacant lot next door to his 13th Avenue home for neighbourhood boys like Carey to come play.

OTTAWA, ON – The Canadian Lacrosse Association (CLA) is pleased to announce the appointments of the coaching and support staff that will help lead and mentor Canada's future stars at next summer's 2019 FIL U-19 Women's Field Lacrosse World Championship in Peterborough, Ontario.

A group of highly qualified coaches will join returning head coach Scott Teeter – who led Canada to a historic gold medal at the 2015 FIL U-19 Women's Field Lacrosse World Championship – on their quest for a second consecutive title.

"I am extremely excited to get the chance to work with Team Canada again and look forward to the opportunity to defend our gold medal on home soil," said Teeter, who also helped guide the senior women's team to silver medals at both the FIL Women's Lacrosse World Cup and IWGA World Games in 2017.

The coaching staff will be made up of the following individuals:

Scott Teeter, Head Coach (Shelburne, ON). Teeter, a resident of Louisville, Kentucky and current head coach of the University of Louisville's women's lacrosse team, will return as head coach of Canada's U-19 women's field team for the third time. In this role, he has led Canada to a historic gold medal performance at the 2015 U-19 World Women's Championship in Edinburgh, Scotland (in their first appearance in the finals) and to a bronze medal at the lacrosse for his high school and box lacrosse for the nearby Orangeville Northmen.

Allison Daley, Associate Head Coach (Peterborough, ON). Daley brings over a decade of international experience, as both a player and coach, to this year's U-19 team. She was an assistant coach with the 2015 U-19 women's team that won gold and has also played for both the senior and U-19 teams as a goaltender. Most recently, in 2017, she was a veteran presence on the senior team that won silver at both the FIL Women's Lacrosse World Cup in England and IWGA World Games in Poland.

Daley is currently the head coach at Canisius College, where she replaced Canadian head coach Scott Teeter just three weeks prior to the start of the 2018 NCAA season. In her first season at the helm, she led the team to the championship game of the MAAC Championship tournament. During her four seasons as a player with Canisius, Daley was a two-time all-conference player and earned IWLCA Regional All-American accolades.

"It is always an honor to have the opportunity to represent your country and I am humbled to have the chance to coach a second time with the Canadian U19 Team," said Daley. "To have the opportunity to represent Canada and to also have the World Championships in my hometown, where I played for the Canadian U19 Team in 2007, is really special. I'm excited to work alongside an incredible coaching staff to defend our World Championship." "I am excited and honoured to be named to the coaching staff of the U-19 national team," said Ranger. "It's special for me to return as a coach to Peterborough where I had my first experience playing for Team Canada on the U-19 team in 2007."

Emily Boissonneault, Assistant Coach (Whitby, ON). Boissonneault is in her third year of coaching at James Madison University and was promoted to associate head coach this year. She was on the sidelines this past season and helped guide the team to their first NCAA Division I national championship and best record at 22-1.

Boissonneault has represented Canada on the last two senior World Cup teams (2017, 2013) and currently plays in the United Women's Lacrosse League (UWLX) for the Boston Storm. She has received numerous awards during her lacrosse career at the University of Detroit, including the Horizon League Women of the Year in 2012 and the President's Award in 2012, the latter presented to the most outstanding senior student-athlete.

"Being chosen as a member of the U19 coaching staff is a dream," said Boissonneault.

Kaylin Morissette, Assistant Coach (Courtice, ON). Morissette is currently a third-year coach at the University of Louisville, where she was a four-year starter. As a player with the national team, the midfielder and draw specialist represented Canada at the 2017 and 2013 FIL Women's Lacrosse World Cups, as well as at the NCAA Division I Women's lacrosse in draw controls. Upon graduation, she was selected by the Baltimore Brave of the Women's Professional Lacrosse League (WPLL) during their inaugural entry draft.

"I am honoured to be selected as one of the coaches of the U-19 national team," said Morissette. "I am so excited share my passion for this sport and our country with the next generation surrounded by the people that helped me fall in love with lacrosse in the first place."

Fred Jenner, Assistant Coach/Team Coordinator (Victoria, BC). Jenner has been coaching the freshmen and sophomore teams in the Team BC girls field lacrosse program for the last five years. His knowledge of the game and his ability to quickly learn a player's strengths and weaknesses is one of his most valuable attributes.

Jenner was the team manager for the senior women's national team at the most recent FIL World Cup in 2017. At the end of the event, he was presented with the FIL Spirit of Lacrosse Award in recognition of his contributions to the team and the national team program. He has also represented Canada as a player with the senior and U-19 men's teams.

"I'm excited to be back working with Team Canada alongside the coaches and players," said Jenner. "I'm looking forward to doing all I can for the team so that the coaching staff and players can focus on their goal of repeating as U-19 World Champions."

Team BC Female Bantam Head Coach, Brad Downey, had an incredible year both on and off the field in 2018.

Downey, a Port Coquitlam Minor Lacrosse product, starred for the BCJALL's Port Coquitlam Junior A Saints in the 90's before being drafted by the Coquitlam Adanacs. This natural goal scorer played 10 seasons (1995-2005) in the WLA with the Coquitlam Adanacs and finished his final two seasons with the Maple Ridge Burrards, winning a Mann Cup in 2001 with the A's.

In the summer of 2018, this first time Team BC Box Head Coach directed the Team BC Female Bantams to a national title with a 5-3 victory over Alberta at the 2018 CLA Female Bantam National Championship in Halifax. A summer to never forget!

"I'm very proud of the girls and what they accomplished. This group of athletes was very coachable, hardworking, and selfless which made this experience very special and one I won't soon forget."

But it was the news from his alma mater that he was selected as an inductee into the Whittier College Purple & Gold Hall of Fame, Class of 2018....that put the cherry on the top of his memorable summer.

"It's quite an honor, especially thinking of all the great players that have gone to Whittier," noted Downey.

Downey played collegiate lacrosse at Whittier College in Los Angeles from 1994-1997 where he led the Poets offensive attack for four seasons.

In his first year, Brad led his team in goals (45G) and was selected to the Western Collegiate Lacrosse League (WCLL) All-Star team. As a sophomore, he was named a team captain and finished the season as team leader in points (89P) and again named the team's best offensive player (1995).

This 4-time WCLL All-Star and 3-time team captain helped the Poets to a perfect season (17-0) and their first WCLL League Championship in 3 years (1996). Along the way, Brad set many NCAA Division 3 scoring records, including most points in a season (163), most goals in a season (107) and most goals per game in a season (6.29).

To round out his college career, with numerous team and league awards on his shelf, he was named the Whittier College Male Team Sport Athlete of the Year as well as USILA All American. As a Senior, Brad helped lead the Poets to a second WCLL title by scoring 101 goals with 68 assists to break his own NCAA scoring record with 169 points. He earned his second USILA All American Award and represented Whittier in the USILA North South All Star game. Brad was also named a USILA Scholar All American, the first for Whittier Lacrosse at that time.

"I'm very proud of my time at Whittier and what the teams were able to accomplish, how our teams got national recognition to help build the next group of players to compete at Nationals. The experience and ceremony was humbling. My parents, wife, and kids all went and it was great. I hope it was a learning experience for my kids."

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Coaches Corner **Canada Games Coaching**

It still needs final official approval, but it seems that box lacrosse will be back in the Canada Summer Games. In 2021, in Niagara, Ontario, lacrosse will make its return to the Canada Summer Games for the first time since 1985.

There are several changes from the 1969-1985 period when lacrosse was previously in the Canada Summer Games. Instead of being at the Junior age group, it will now be Midget (U17 box). And it will be both male and female. The Midget (U17 box) nationals will be replaced in 2021 with participation in the Canada Summer Games. This is all great news for lacrosse!

However, there is one big challenge -- Coaching. As per the rules of the Canada Summer Games, all members of the coaching staff must be competitive-development certified. And they need to be certified by February 8, 2021.

The Canadian Lacrosse Association (CLA) has been delivering competitive-development courses for almost a decade, so there is a pool of coaches (primarily in Alberta, but also in BC, Ontario, and Nova Scotia) who have received some training at the competitive-development context. But there is only one coach who has successfully gone through the entire certification process (lacrosse and multisport training plus evaluation) in all of Canada. Clearly work needs to be done since there needs to be a pool of about 100 competitivedevelopment certified coaches across the country.

The good news is that the CLA has developed a multi-faceted plan. In January 2019, there will be a training session for learning facilitators and evaluators to deliver the competitive-development course. The lacrosse-specific portion of the

course has also been redesigned to only run on two weekends instead of three. This will increase the amount of multisport modules (coaching and leading effectively, psychology of performance, prevention & recovery, leading drug-free sport, and developing athletic abilities), but coaches have more flexibility in when they can take these modules. Finally, there will be an intensive schedule of training sessions across Canada: Part 1 in February 2019 in Toronto Part 2 in March 2019 in Calgary Part 1 in September 2019 in Halifax Part 1 in September 2019 in Regina Part 2 in November 2019 in Moncton Part 2 in November 2019 in Winnipeg Part 1 in January 2020 in Vancouver Part 2 in February 2020 in Montreal

There are two additional challenges beyond the requirement for competitive-development certified coaches. First, there needs to be one Indigenous coach on the staff of both the male and female teams. One of the reasons that lacrosse was accepted back in the Canada Summer Games was because the CLA emphasized the Indigenous roots and character of the game. Ensuring a competitive-development certified Indigenous coach will not be an issue for some provinces, but it will be a potential issue for other (mainly smaller) provinces. Therefore, the CLA and Member Associations are creating opportunities for Indigenous coaches.

Second, each female team has to have a female head coach. Despite the growth in female box lacrosse (especially in the large provinces of Ontario, BC, and Alberta), the vast majority of the coaches remain men. Therefore, the CLA and Member Association are creating opportunities for female coaches.

The process to successfully certify a pool of competitive-development coaches (male and female) will take a lot of work. But the benefits of inclusion in the Canada Summer Games makes it highly worthwhile. Moreover, all of lacrosse will benefit by having a cohort of competitive-devel-

opment certified coaches across Canada who can become leaders and mentors in their communities.

(i.e. an on-the-spot lunge to traveling lunge), altering the base of support (i.e. transitioning from a wide squat to a single leg squat), or adding in object manipulation (i.e. touching the hand to the ground on a side lunge) are all

fitness and skill level of the player will dictate the number of reps and sets they complete for each exercise. Always start gradual, 12-15 reps for 1-3 sets and assess whether progression or regression is needed. In addition, swap out any of your favourite moves. Use the fundamentals as a guideline and be creative. Box Lacrosse, react in multiple situations. Therefore, train the way you want to play for greater success.

This training information is best recommended for athletes U13 and older.



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Fundamental Movement Training

As our young athletes transition into Box Lacrosse after Field season, it is an ideal time to consider adding a new training regime to our player's workouts. With the skills crossover being relatively interchangeable, the movement patterning and preparation can be amped up. When developing well-rounded exercise programs, sport performance specialists take into consideration seven fundamental movement patterns. These movements include a squat, lunge, hip hinge, plank, push, pull and rotation. For example, shooting often uses a lunging, pulling, pushing and rotational action. All executed at speed.

With that in mind, training programs that focus only on a few of the fundamental movements can create muscular imbalances. Injuries in athletes are commonly caused when one

muscle group is stronger than the other. Poor movement patterning is also a factor. A relatively small difference in strength from one muscle group to another is almost two-times more likely to cause injuries. Layer on poor patterning, and the risk increases.

In the training world, a common saying is that weight stack machines build muscles, but they don't necessarily train movement. Therefore, using one's own body as resistance is the best moving machine around. The exercise sequence uses no equipment; perfect for any at-home or do anywhere workout. It covers the seven fundamental movements and layers in task complexity to create a more challenging training ground.

Increasing task complexity is as simple as making movement patterns more multifaceted. Shifting from a stationary to dynamic move

examples of increasing task complexity. To better foster your young athlete's success, begin with the base moves. The age,

Fundamental Movement	Base Move	Increasing Task Complexity	VIASPORT
Lunge	Alternating Lunges	Alternate lunging forward and lunging back on the same leg. On the forward lunge, cross both arms under the front knee. On the reverse back lunge, reach for or touch the floor. Repeat on the other leg. Start slow then mix up the tempo.	
Squat	Wide Squat	In a wide-legged squat position, toes out, extend the arms overhead and to the sides. Lower the body while mimicking the ac- tion of a lat pull down. As you return to the start position the arms go up. Repeat. Focus on keeping the knees behind the toes and concentrating on activating the back muscles. For more intensity add in low jumps at the end of the set.	
Hinge	Dead lift	Start in a standing position. Hinging forward from the hips, place the hands on the ground. Walk the hands along the ground extending the body into a plank position. From the plank, perform a push up. Walk the hands back towards the feet and return up to the starting position. Repeat and add additional push ups each set.	
Push	Push Up	In a push up position, place one hand in line with the shoulder and one hand closer to the hip. Perform an off-set push up. Change the hand positions and repeat.	
Pull	Back Con- tractions	In a standing position, with a slight hinge forward, extend the arms out to the sides. Draw the shoulder blades together. Focus on contracting the upper back muscles. Release and repeat. Change the tempo of the movement for a greater challenge.	
Plank	Forearm Plank	With the forearms on the ground, hips lifted and level, body long, and core activated, reach and extend one arm out the side. Allow the fingertips to rest on the ground. Hold for 4 seconds. Repeat on the other side without lowering to the ground.	
Rotation	Side to Side Twists	Lying down, draw the feet in towards the gluts. Lift the hips, maintain a neutral spine and extend the arms to the sides. Keep the hips lifted. Reach and rotate the right arm across the body, touching the extended left hand. Return to the start position and rotate in the opposite direction, moving towards the right. Repeat.
