Chilliwack applied and was awarded year end U11 tournament, but once again the weather wasn't on their side and proposed it but ended up cancelling due to lack of teams being available for the weekend that it was changed to. So they didn't have a year-end tournament.

Beth McLucas Chair – Field Directorate "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times." Charles Dickens, A Tale of Two Cities

This season has shown us what can happen when people work together for a common goal. It showed that when adversity hit, people with the will and the desire can make extraordinary things happen. It takes a great deal of effort to put on a Provincial Championship. The process starts in August and step by step it ramps up until 40-50 teams play for six titles in one weekend. When weather prevented the event from happening it took a herculean effort to put the event together in two weeks. Clubs scrambled for volunteers and field time. Schedules were made, remade, and remade again. Families, coaches, and officials pivoted to be available for a second weekend. Everyone put their energy towards making the event happen FOR THE PLAYERS.

In contrast, we were witness to some of the most horrible, selfish behaviour that I have seen in youth lacrosse. In contrast to the collaborative effort that I have previously described, this myopic behaviour does nothing to advance the game. We see parents putting their child ahead of the team, coaches putting their teams above other teams, and Associations putting their needs ahead of the greater good of the game. The development leagues finished with two exclusionary tournaments, one of which was cancelled due to weather. What are we teaching our kids?

I would also like to call attention to how our volunteers and officials are treated. I would say that in large part most people recognize the time and effort that volunteers like coaches, managers and executives put in. I also recognize that most people appreciate the effort of the officials on the field, but those who don't are extremely vocal, selfish, cruel and sometimes foul. Especially those who direct this disgusting behaviour at children. Unfortunately, it is those people who are having the biggest negative impact on our recruitment and retention of officials. The leaders in this game, be it coaches, managers, club executives or directorate executives, need to hold these people accountable for the benefit of the game. Sometimes tough conversations need to be had and in the course we may lose a few players or families. Ultimately our game will be stronger for it.

What everyone needs to recognize is that we are all part of something bigger. We have the privilege of participating in this great game. With that comes the responsibility to make it a great game for everyone. Medals and trophies are nice, and excellence should be recognized but at what cost. Arbitrary boundaries and economic conditions create the opportunities for some players but really, they also serve to divide us and create animosity. We need to advocate for ourselves and be the best we can be but not at the expense of others or the game itself. Those with passion and ideas should work within the system to make it better, not try and tear it down from the outside. We have a great game that provides our athletes with more opportunities than ever before. Let's do what we can to support all of them.

I would like to say thank you to League Chairs and executives, to commissioners and schedulers, referees and assignors. I would also like to thank my fellow members of the Field Directorate. Their dedication to the game is unmatched. And thank you to Jill Krop who once again demonstrated that she puts the players and the game above all else.

PCFLL 2024/25 Season Report to the BCLA Field Directorate Special Session

Member clubs of the PCFLL again accrued significant growth in the 2024/25 season across both Women's and Youth Field Lacrosse. Women's registrations increased by 140 athletes to 681 and Youth increased 293 athletes to 2066 for a total of 2747. This is the fourth straight year of growth for the league as a whole and a testament to the work done at the club level by our members.

2024/25 held several firsts for the league, including playing games the weekend immediately following Labour Day, our first season with U18 at Women's and Youth,

Congratulations to all of our PCFLL Champions as well as Provincial Championships. At provincials, the PCFLL captured 13 Women's medals and 13 Youth medals.

PCFLL members were disappointed with the BCLA decision to discontinue the U11 Provincial Tournaments this season. The Youth event was always highly anticipated, a precursor to participation in Provincials. Field Lacrosse is not Box lacrosse, and our numbers still lag behind Box. Tournaments like the U11 Provincial Tournament served as an important event within our small community.

Appeals of decisions and hearings appear to be on the increase season over season with 2024/25 having the highest league involvement over the past several years. Appeals take several forms and have differing reasons, some valid, some spurious. While not overly impactful at the moment, the trend is concerning given the amount of decisions the clubs and leagues are required to make in the course of operations.

Officials shortages continued to be an issue and resulted in game cancellations and the inability to host games during tournament weekends. The PCFLL encourages the BCLA to promote officiating to adults and those that can move quickly up the ranks to officiate the older age groups to mitigate the issue of youth officials leaving officiating in their late teens and early 20's due to other priorities.

The PCFLL continues to explore new opportunities to provide Tier 1 players the opportunity to play on Tier 1 teams by identifying and releasing players to form net-new Tier 1 teams where possible. This has been a successful experiment but remains a work in progress as it requires manual work on behalf of a volunteer committee and the executive.

The league depends on a committed group of volunteers who work tirelessly to ensure the success of the sport. These volunteers include:

- Stacy Paterson and Michael Miele, who served as Vice-Chairs and contributed significantly to the league.
  - Stacy has moved to the interior and will not remain with the PCFLL board after the upcoming AGM. Stacy has dedicated years to the PCFLL and the Women's game as a volunteer with her local club, the PCFLL, and she remains an active member of the Field Directorate. The PCFLL thanks Stacy for her commitment to the game and we wish her many glasses of wine in her new Naramata location.
- Mary Clare and the Commissioner team for their efforts in administering the sport week in and week out.
  - Mary will be stepping down at the conclusion of this season. The PCFLL is not alone in being a beneficiary of Mary's time over the past years. Mary wears her love of the game on her sleeve and we'll miss her.
- On the women's side, Stacy and Angie Reid ensured that games were scheduled and officials were present.
- For Youth, Angie Wolfe and Susan dos Santos worked to move officials around to cover as many games as possible.
- Lynda Callard served as Treasurer and Registrar ensuring money in the bank and bills being paid.
- Karen Cameron (now with 50% more Goulet!) served in her first year as League Secretary. Karen
  converted the league executive to Google Workspace and ensured communication to the league
  stakeholder groups was kept up to date.

The league also thanks the volunteers on the Field Directorate for their time during the season, Beth McLucas, David Goulet, & Stacy Paterson in particular as the Chair and Vice-Chairs responsible for athletes in the PCFLL. Overall, the 2024/25 season was a success for women's and youth field lacrosse. The PCFLL is grateful for the dedication and hard work of its member clubs, club representatives, and volunteers who have been critical to the continued growth of the league.

## BC Lacrosse Field Directorate Special Session April 12, 2025

#### **Interior Field Lacrosse Commission (IFLC)**

IFLC consists of 6 active Associations: Kamloops, Kelowna, Nicola Valley, North Okanagan, Penticton and Shuswap.

Not that much going on in the zone right now regarding field lacrosse. The zone had a very good year with with the following teams in the season:

- 3 teams in U18
- 3 teams in U15
- 3 teams in U13
- 3 teams in U11
- 4 teams in U7/U9 (all associations combined numbers)

The interior had no representation in field lacrosse provincial championships. Originally having U13-T2 and U18-T2 set to attend the originally scheduled event, it was not possible for the teams to commit to the rescheduled event.

This year saw improvements over last season. Our registration numbers were a little lower in U11 through U18 than in previous years. However, our numbers in U7/U9 were considerably higher. During the season, U7 and U9 each had their own time slots to have games, which is something remarkable as that had not happened before. That tells on how good the numbers were in those divisions. Our referee numbers improved slightly and no games were canceled this season.

IFLC has not had its AGM yet, it will take place later in the year. Some positions are vacant and the commission is recruiting to fill those in.

The commission is looking forward to another successful year, no season would be possible without the kids and the volunteers that provide their valuable time in the name of the sport.

#### SENIOR MENS FIELD LACROSSE REPORT MARCH 2025

In the Lower Mainland the senior men opened their season September 16th with 8 teams. They began playing 2 games in Coquitiam and 2 games in North Delta having lost our spot in New Westminster to soccer youth teams. A couple of teams struggle with numbers out to league games, but so far there have been few forfeits.

The ALL Western league also resumed their season in December and although we haven't had a direct conflict with games played on Saturday nights, I believe they continue to impact our numbers.

We were impacted by ice and snow for 2 weekends in February and an atmospheric river in November which cancelled league play.

Provincials are booked for the Easter long weekend in Coquitlam, April 19<sup>th</sup> and 20th. First draft of the schedule has been done. Unfortunately the dates conflict with start of box season and the AHM tournament in Prague, so we have lost players to both of these.

Tyson Leies spearheaded a league in Victoria 2 years ago which had 4 teams competing and has increased to 6 teams this year. He has not declared any teams for provincials as he has two teams collapsing. He told me he is running 6 games each week, running out if funds to sustain it, and I found out that he only has 100 players registered and catering to the U18's who don't have a league to play in other than mens.

I had some discussion with Nanaimo who were also interested in starting a league, my last correspondence with them was that they had guys come out and play scrimmage games, but are not interested in the provincial tournament at this time.

Nothing from the interior at this time.

This year we have had no game reports in the lower mainland.

We are still unable to get gaming as a league, and although several avenues have been investigated there doesn't seem to be anything for senior players at present.

Nationals were cancelled for 2024. We have indicated that we would be able and willing to host for 2025, but I have been told that the Ross Cup is on hold until there is more interest from other provinces to participate, which seems to be a bit of a Catch 22.

VC – Mens Field Report

A total of 181 officials were certified this season up from 174 last year:

- 105 Entry Level/L1 an increase of 1 from last year
- 50 Level 2 an increase of 7 from last year
- 26 Level 3,4,5 a decrease of 1 from last year.

Thank you to all of the coaches, players, managers and parents for your patience with the schedulers and the assignors as we try to get as many games played each weekend as possible and limit the amount of postponements and cancellations.

There were 3 in season tournaments this year (Ridge Meadows, Langley, and Richmond) all hosted between Thanksgiving and Remembrance Day. The timing of the tournaments early in the year allowed for a lot of mentoring/evaluating of the younger officials that set them up for success throughout the year. The mentoring program that was initiated in 2022 was again utilized this year, thank you to all of the senior officials that gave their time to help out the younger officials during the season and at the tournaments.

The year end U9 jamboree was hosted by Mission, unfortunately the year end U11 tournament that was to be played in Chilliwack was cancelled.

Youth provincials were scheduled to be hosted in Langley however they were also cancelled as the fields were closed. The rescheduled provincials were hosted by Richmond, Coquitlam and Ridge Meadows Feb 27-Mar 2. A total of 36 officials were used across the 4 days. That included 6 from Victoria, 1 from Nanaimo and 1 from the Interior. Thank you to all the volunteers and staff who made the event possible. Thank you to all of the hosts that secured field time and made the rescheduled event happen.

There are two Mens Leagues in BC- 1 based in Metro Vancouver and 1 in Victoria, both finish their regular season at the end of March. There is a year end tournament scheduled for Easter Weekend in Coquitlam.

#### BCLA 2024 Vice Chair Women's Field Officials Report

This last season, we had 66 Women's Field officials (41 on the mainland and 25 on the Island):

- 1 Level 3 official
- 11 Level 2 officials
- 18 Returning Level 1 officials + 6 Island
- 11 New Level 1 officials + 19 Island

This year, we had a great interest on the island. This season was the first year for the Van Island Cup in Nanaimo. This tournament was paramount in assisting new and returning officials to gain on field experience and hone their official skills.

We began the 2024-2025 season with the Big Al 7V7 tournament hosted by Coquitlam. This tournament is always a welcome start to the season as it gives all the officials an opportunity to officiate on field to get back into officiating women's field. We hope to continue this tradition next season.

Another great opportunity was the Langley Thunderstrike Tournament. This tournament enabled us to provide feedback and evaluations to officials early in the season to set them up for more success as the season continued. This also provided us the opportunity to see who would be looking to move up to Level 2 and to mentor and encourage them to do so. We are hoping to use this tournament and the Van Island Cup as a way to help mentor and evaluate officials from other provinces who do not have the ability to officiate women's field on a regular basis.

We have had a couple adults sign up to officiate and it continues to prove successful. I would encourage associations to continue to recruit adults as well youth to umpire next seasons. Many younger officials often leave to go to university which makes scheduling officials for U18 games. I am proposing we ensure each and every association provides at least 1-2 adult officials to ensure we have coverage in seasons moving forward.

On the mainland, we have many games starting Saturday mornings, which spreads the officials thin.

For Women's field Provincials, we were able to run the entire Provincials with no weather issues, beyond rain. We had two officials travel from the island to support us at Provincials, but with such a lack of officials at the U18 level, I had to officiate throughout the weekend.

I want to thank Charlie Jones for scheduling officials all season with my support and Stacy Paterson for working so well with us on the schedule. She helped to move games around when needed so we had fewer cancellations. Central allocation continues to prove successful.

My recommendations for this next season would be as follows:

- Associations continue to recruit more adults as well as youth starting in early August (especially since all
  umpires must be certified (or recertified) by November 11<sup>th</sup> of the playing season. This would include
  recruiting back those officials back from university.
- Continue with on field mentorship of newer officials and officially evaluating umpires for continued improvement.
- Looking at the potential ability to hold 'play days' at 2 or 3 different locations every weekend. This would allow officials to be mentored and enable them to have more games (since they would not be spread thin in the am) – These would be like mini one day tournaments.

#### **Team BC Field Lacrosse Special Session - Report**

After one of the most successful seasons in 2024, we look to build on this in 2025. We had close to 450 athletes participate in our Men's and Women's Tryout Camp in December 2024 and February/March 2025. The weather cooperated despite some scares in February and all the camps ran smoothly.

From the Provincial Tryout Camps, 5 Men's Teams (U14 / U15 / U16 / U17 / U19) and 6 Women's Teams (Middle School / Freshmen / Sophomore / Junior / Senior / U19) were selected to train and compete at elite events across the United States as well as National Championships. Last summer was historic for Team BC Field as it was the first time ever that Team BC Field captured all three major national championships in the same summer. Our teams won the 2024 Jenny Kyle Cup - U19 Women's Field National Championships, 2024 First Nations Trophy - U19 Men's Field National Championships, and the 2024 Alumni Cup - U17 Men's Field National Championships.

This year we have an impressive number of athletes (19 males - 20 females) receiving scholarship offers to attend a variety of Colleges and Universities in the United States and Canada. The Team BC Field Lacrosse Program currently has over 100 Female and Male athletes actively competing at the collegiate level in Canada and in the United States.

I am incredibly proud of the growth and development of our female and male lacrosse coaches and athletes. The 2025-26 season is especially exciting as it marks a historic milestone: for the first time, the Women's Field Program boasts female Head Coaches leading all six of our teams!

The Women's U19 Field Nationals in Coquitlam, BC, and the Men's U17 and U19 Field Nationals in Halifax, Nova Scotia, are set to take place this summer. With our sights set on another Golden Summer, we are eager to build on our past successes. This program's achievements wouldn't be possible without the support of the BCLA staff, the Board of Directors, and our local clubs. A special thank you goes to the Langley Thunder and Coquitlam Adanacs for their generous assistance in providing additional field time for practices and evaluations whenever needed.

Dedicate one or two nights a week at a certain location, so teams know when they will play each week and would allow them to be more prepared for rides, etc. (Wednesday Night Lights).

- Keep the shorter games and play two games a week on the same night.
- Shorten the season and just play September November.
- Introduce Officiating training into the schools.
- Don't change anything.
