## 2023 BCLA Annual General Meeting Elections -- Executive Positions

### BCLA EXECUTIVE DUTIES

#### **The President** **1-Year remaining 2 Year Term**

Shall preside at all general meetings and Executive meetings of the Association. The President shall generally supervise all the affairs of the Association and shall be primarily responsible for the development and maintenance of the program of the Association. If the President is unable to carry out the duties, the President shall appoint a Vice President to do so.

#### **The Vice President – Development** **1-Year remaining 2 Year Term**

Responsible for Development Committee and responsible for athlete and regional development, human resource development and education.

#### **The Vice President – Technical Programs** **1-Year remaining 2 Year Term**

Responsible for the oversight of the BC Lacrosse Coaches and Officials Technical Support Groups and development of those programs including certification, human resources and education.

#### **The Vice President – Administration and Finance** **2 Year Term**

Responsible for overseeing office, membership services, maintaining Operating Policy and Constitution, and short and long term planning. Also responsible for providing oversight and counsel for all of the financial practices of the organization; to ensure that the financial records of the Association are audited by an auditor appointed by the Executive; and to ensure that a report, which includes a budget for the coming year, is provided at every Annual Meeting of the Association.

#### **The Vice President – Operations** **2 Year Term**

Responsible for Operations Committee and functions pertaining to inter-Directorate and inter-provincial operational matters; jurisdiction, appeals, discipline, et cetera, and main communication link between planning/policy and operations.

#### **The Vice President - Performance Programs** **2 Year Term**

Working collaboratively with the respective BCLA Executive Members, Committees, Directorates and Technical Support Groups, and BCLA Staff, responsible to oversee the BCLA's performance programs including the Team BC – Box and Field Programs, the Volunteer Leadership Program, and any other performance programs as designated by the BCLA Executive.

**Secretary****2 Year Term**

Responsible to attend and record minutes of all Executive meetings and the Annual General Meeting, preparing and distributing all proposed change to the Constitution and By-Lays and Operating Policies as per By-Law IV: Meetings, and shall submit all required reports, documents and changes to the Constitution and By-Laws as required under the Societies Act.

**The Director at Large****2 Year Term**

Responsible for special projects as assigned by the President or the Executive.

**1. Acknowledgement/Welcome/Call to Order**

The meeting was called to order at 10:34 by BCLA President Gerry Van Beek presiding.

Gerry welcomed all members to the 2022 BCLA AGM General Session, being hosted via Zoom, and provided the Territorial Acknowledgement indicating the BC Lacrosse Association acknowledges that many Indigenous Nations have longstanding relationships, both historic and modern, with the territories upon which our Association and Member Associations are located. Gerry acknowledged the meeting was being hosted at his location at the BCLA office which is on the unceded territory of the Coast Salish, Stz'uminus (Chemanius), Tsleil-Waututh, Stó:lō, & Kwikwetlem First Nation peoples.

Gerry acknowledged the professionalism of the BCLA staff in their running of large-scale Zoom meetings and the Spirit Awards slide show that was run in advance of the AGM. Thank you to the staff for all their hard work over the past year.

Gerry explained voting and meeting procedures to all attendees. Participants were to use their “yes” and “no” buttons when voting and the “raise hand” button if they want to speak. The “chat” function was disabled as was not being formally monitored during the meeting.

Gerry stated that the AGM provides the opportunity for members to say their part and give direction to the BCLA leadership.

Gerry advised all members that the meeting was being recorded for purposes of accuracy of these minutes.

**2. Approval of the October 15, 2022 BCLA Annual General Meeting Agenda**

**3. Approval of Minutes of the October 16, 2021 BCLA Annual General Meeting**

*It was moved by Dave Wilkie seconded by Sean Reid, that the Minutes of the 2021 BC Lacrosse Association Annual General Meeting be adopted as circulated. CARRIED.*

**5. Executive Reports**

a) President: Gerry Van Beek

b) Vice President – Administration and Finance: Angie Schwan  
Gerry thanked Angie for her multiple years of service on the BCLA Board.

Angie noted an amendment to her report regarding the Lacrosse Canada fee increases:

- Correction of the calendar year that the increases would come into effect (2024/25, not 2023/24)
- The fee increase per player will be from \$4 to \$15
- There will be incremental increases for officials from \$15 to \$25, as well as coaches from \$5 to \$20
- The fee increase will be substantial. Currently the BCLA pays approximately \$75,000 to Lacrosse Canada. The fee increases will raise this amount to approximately \$250,000.

***It was moved by Angie Schwan seconded by Beth McLucas, that the BCLA's 2022 Financial Report, including the budget be approved as presented in the Annual Report. CARRIED***

c) Secretary: Nichola Manning  
Nothing to add, no questions.

d) Vice President – Operations: Russ Sheppard  
Russ was unable to fulfil his role over the past year due to work commitments. Gerry and Jeff covered off his responsibilities. No report submitted.

e) Vice President – Performance Programs: Gord Kask  
Gerry thanked Gord for his leadership with the BCLA performance programs and noted the many successes Team BC experienced this year.

Nothing to add, no questions.

f) Vice President – Development: Terry Mosdell  
Nothing to add, no questions.

g) Vice President - Technical Programs: Dennis Quigley  
Nothing to add, no questions.

h) Director at Large: David Jenkins  
Nothing to add, no questions

i) Executive Director: formerly Jeff Gombar  
Gerry informed the membership that Jeff recently resigned from the BCLA and thanked him for his service, acknowledging that Jeff stepped into the role at the onset of the covid-19 pandemic and tirelessly guided the organization through challenging times. On behalf of the membership, Gerry expressed his appreciation for all of Jeff's efforts.

## 6. Directorate/Technical Support Group Reports

- a) Senior Directorate (Dave Wilkie)  
Dave was elected back for another two year term. The Senior Directorate will be planning out new forms and meeting times. No questions to Dave's report.
- b) Minor Directorate (Gordon McIntosh)  
Gord reported that there were many female box lacrosse proposals that came forward during the Minor Directorate Special Session with some excellent changes being introduced. Provincials dates for 2023 have been set and host applications being sought. Dee Bowley-Cowan will continue as Secretary and Gord will continue as Chair for the next 2 years. No questions to Gord's report
- c) Field Directorate (Beth McLucas)  
The Field Directorate held their Special Session back in April. Dylan Taylor as Secretary, Beth as Chair, Kelly Ohlmann as Female Vice Chair and Mary Clare as Men's Vice Chair. They are looking for a host for female field lacrosse provincials. No questions to Beth's report.
- d) BC Lacrosse Coaches Group (Russ Sheppard)  
Reference Lacrosse Canada revisions of coaching manuals. Acknowledged that it has been a difficult experience with Lacrosse Canada on the coaches committee with limited BC representation. No questions to Russ' report.
- e) BC Lacrosse Officials Group (Andy Watson)  
The recruitment and retention of officials was a big theme coming out of the Special Session and are looking at a number of innovative solutions to recruit and retain officials. Gerry acknowledged that BC officials were amazing at Nationals. Dallas Lister replaced Wilson Louie as Vice Chair. The Officials Group is looking forward to in-person engagements in the upcoming year. No questions to Andy's report
- f) BC Lacrosse Volunteer Technical Support Group  
No report submitted. All positions in the BCLVTSG are currently all unfilled.

## 7. Credentials Report (Nichola Manning)

### b) BCLA General Operating Policy

---

*It was moved by Angie Schwan seconded by Wes Tyres, to amend REGULATION 5: TRAVEL, 5.01 (iv) to read as follows:*

**5.01** Travel expenses will be paid by the Association as follows:

- (iv) Other travel --as authorized by the Executive, and *updated annually on January 1 of each calendar year, according to the Canada Revenue Agency guidelines as publish on the CRA website (Reasonable per-kilometre allowance – Canada.ca)\**

Every effort must be made to keep costs down when travelling to and from meetings, events, etc. It is expected that if air travel and/or renting a vehicle is less expensive than per km expenses, that people will make the more economical travel arrangements. If more than one person is travelling from the same area, every effort must be made to car pool. When practical, use of telephone conferencing should be considered as a substitute for in-person attendance at regular meetings.

Ferry-- actual cost

Other fares -- actual cost

Meals -- up to \$40.00/day

Accommodation -- up to \$100.00/day

Sean Reid withdrew the proposed amendment of Regulation 7 Title and add new **REGULATION 7: PLAYER AND OFFICIAL REGISTRATION** that read:

**7.5 Official Registration**

- 7.51** *Each association shall determine and approve registration for certified box lacrosse officials they wish to be involved for the coming season for their association.*
- 7.52** *All Entry Level 1 and Level 1 Minor/Youth officials (Box/Field) must register within the set boundaries (based on his/her primary residence within a city, town, municipality, school district, etc.) of the appropriate Directorate as determined by the specific Commission/League.*
- 7.53** *If an official has moved residences to another association, Grandfathering (2 full seasons of experience in box/field respectively) to previous association must be approved by the home association for Entry level 1 and Level 1 officials. Otherwise, it is expected these officials register within their new home association community.*
- 7.54** *The local Commissions/Leagues are responsible to administer these boundaries and for providing these boundaries to the BCLA Office, through their respective Directorates.*
- 7.55** *Any person legally residing, either temporarily or permanently, in British Columbia may register as an official of the BC Lacrosse Association.*
- 7.56** *Out of Country residents may become members on an annual basis by applying for placement through a league and ratification by the appropriate Directorate. Potential members must apply to Minor Box/Senior Box/Field Directorate for approval and must follow the applicable registration and transfer procedures.*
- 7.57** *All members must have medical insurance (equivalent to BC Medical Insurance coverage). Members without a BC Care Card must provide proof of basic health insurance.*

**If 7.5 passes, Add new regulation**

**7.6 Official Travel Fees**

- 7.61** *Officials travelling more than 30km roundtrip shall be reimbursed for their travel at the set BCLA travel rate per BCLA policy.*
- 7.62** *The origin departing point for each official shall be the set boundaries set out in “7.5 Official Registration.” For officials where this has not been determined, the Vice-Chair of Senior Officials will make the determination for officials based on the closest postal code for senior officials who also referee minor lacrosse.*

**It was moved by John Hamilton seconded by Tim Frost, to amend REGULATION 12: GENDER EQUITY, 12.02 to read:**

- 12.02** *The BCLA will encourage Gender Equity by:*
  - a)** *Ensuring that the achievement of equal opportunities is a key consideration when developing, updating or delivering BCLA programs;*
  - b)** *Ensuring that the needs and concerns of all genders are identified, promoted and supported;*
  - c)** *Ensuring that the governance structure encourages and promotes full and equal opportunities of all genders;*
  - d)** *Ensuring that all staff has equal opportunities to participate in decision-making, advance in management, and receive equal remuneration.*

- e) *Co-operating with other organizations such as Sport Canada, Sport BC, CAAWS, et al., to promote equal opportunities for all genders;*
- f) *Providing international leadership with the IF in the promotion of equal opportunities for all genders;*
- g) *Encouraging all international games and event organizers to provide for equal opportunities for all genders to participate.*

*It was moved by Angie Schwan seconded by Wuilbur Jaramillo, to amend APPENDIX A: BCLA APPEALS POLICY AND PROCESS, Appeal Board members Point 15, to read:*

15. *Each hearing will have a Chair and three to seven panel members. The panel members will have the jurisdiction of, and may exercise and perform the powers and duties provided to them under this bylaw. In the case of a hearing necessary under Section 14.03.2 (Harassment) Policy, the panel should make every effort to be comprised of a minimum 51% of the same gender as the Appellant.*

THANK YOU to the BC Lacrosse Association (BCLA) Staff (Jill, Deb, Dave & Shannon). They managed the changes fantastically. We appreciate their dedication to our members.

THANK YOU to the contracted staff including Corinne, Darcy, & Mitch. Their roles are vital to the continued management & support of lacrosse programming.

THANK YOU to the BCLA Board members for their guidance and dedication to the lacrosse during the past year.

I am excited that we are again meeting in person. An opportunity for celebrating & honouring the tremendous volunteers in person.

This report recaps and reports events since last AGM. Many items are covered in other member's reports.

BCLA teams always compete honourably on all the National Stages. Special congrats go to the U13 Female Box Team, U19 Women's Field Team, and the Ladner Pioneers on capturing Gold in their Nationals.

BC hosted two Nationals this year – the Founders and Mann Cups. Thanks to Port Coquitlam and New Westminster for making BCLA proud with the excellent hosting of the competition.

Lacrosse Canada (LC) held an in person Annual Meetings in Ottawa in November 2022 & Semi-Annual Meeting of the Members in New Westminster in May. The Annual Meeting was attended by Matt Doherty & I. The Semi-Annual Meetings were attended by many BCLA leaders representing our directorates and technical support groups well. Thanks to Gord McIntosh, Paul Dal Monte, Jamie Scott, Beth McLucas, Stacy Patterson, Bianca Santucci, Andy Watson, and Russ Shephard for taking the time to attend their respective sessions.

These meetings dealt with some changes for the Lacrosse Long Term Athlete Development (LTAD), Finances, and Governance Structure of LC.

- Unanimous approval of removal of gratuitous off-ball aggression. Rule changes and implementation plans forthcoming.
- National Championships.
- Sixes Sector has plans presented for approval at upcoming meetings.
- Fee increases to LC for members of BCLA for participants, Coaches, & Officials. The elimination of successive deficit budgets brought on by increased Team Canada and

governance funding requirements.

- LC BOD has a suite of By-Law changes discussed in May and approved in September that will change the BOD to become in line with Sport Canada requirements and recommendations. Highlights are...
  - No more than 60% of board members can be of the same gender.
  - 40% of the board must have no fiduciary duty to any lacrosse entity besides LC.
- Next changes include BOD Members becoming Directors At Large (or similar) and roles and responsibilities being allocated from pool of BOD members.
  - Member Associations (like BCLA) will continue having representation on the LC BOD.

Since the initial writing of this report. Lacrosse is in the 2028 Olympics. Great news! This stage will help lacrosse grow in many ways. We as leaders need to figure out how to deal with all five (5) disciplines of our sport. The upcoming Strategic Planning session in November will be a big step in coordinating and allocating our energies and resources.

**BCLA Vice President – Finance & Administration Report: Nichola Manning**

I am pleased to provide the following report for the BCLA 2023 AGM and send my sincere regrets for not being able to attend this year's meeting but know that I will be at another lacrosse related event with my son down in Denver. I have now completed my first year of a two-year term as the VP of Finance & Administration and present to you the following observations.

There have been significant staffing changes within the BCLA office. In October 2022, our former Executive Director, Jeff Gombar left the BCLA. We thank Jeff for his dedication and years of service to the sport of lacrosse. During the transition period, the Board appointed Gerry van Beek to perform double duty as President as well as Interim-Executive Director while the search began for a new Executive Director. In March 2023 we appointed our new Executive Director, Jill Krop, who over the past few months has brought on a welcome new energy, perspective, and passion for the sport of lacrosse and the BCLA office. Early this Fall, we also said goodbye and thank you to Matt Doherty who left to pursue a new opportunity with the BC Ringette Association and welcomed Shannon Andres as the new Director of Marketing and Communications. Rounding out the BCLA office team are our veterans Debbie Heard, Business Manager and Dave Showers, Technical Director who both continue to put tireless effort and hours into running the business of BCLA. To all our staff, thank you for your efforts and commitment to lacrosse. You are all very much appreciated!

Based on my monthly review of financial statements, BCLA continues to be in a solid financial position. Our audited financial statements for 2022/23 were not yet available for my review at the time of writing this report and unfortunately, they will not be available for membership review at the October 20, 2023 AGM. My sincere apologies for this delay, but there were some organizational changes with our auditor and this year the audit has taken longer than expected, based on our past audit experiences. This said, I am not anticipating any issues with the audit.

To rectify the lack of audited financial statements for membership review at the AGM, we will be calling an extraordinary meeting of the members either in late November or early December to review the statements and answer any questions of the membership. We will also need to discuss the Lacrosse Canada fee increases, as was highlighted in the VP Finance & Admin report from the 2022 AGM. Currently we are charged \$4/player and due to the Lacrosse Canada fee increase, as well as inflation, we anticipate that costs will rise to \$10/player starting in 2024. I am not asking you to vote on this issue today, I am just giving the heads-up that this is something we will need to grapple with in the near future.

Also to note in terms of major expenditures, of course will be the cost of this AGM. This is the first time we've been able to hold the AGM in-person and it is a wonderful opportunity to reconnect and catch-up with friends and lacrosse colleagues from around the Province. However, there are significant savings to be had with the hosting of virtual AGM's. We may want to consider alternating years of in-person and virtual AGMs in the future.

After the 2023 AGM, BCLA will start the process of renewing the Strategic Plan. I'm looking forward to the results that will outline a five-year refresh and am hoping there will be an emphasis on renewing our governance structures so that better collaborative and cohesive decision making across the BCLA Board, Directorates, Technical Support Groups, Commissions, and Associations may occur.

I would like to thank the BCLA membership for continuing to entrust me in this role. In addition, much gratitude goes out to my Board colleagues for their support and collegiality over the past year(s). I look forward to continuing to advocate for, and be innovative with, the best sport in the world – lacrosse!

## 2023 BCLA AGM REPORT - JASON GOLLER, VP PERFORMANCE

I joined the board at the 2022 AGM as VP Performance in filling in the last half of a vacant 2 year term and after considering the options I will not be running at the 2023 BCLA AGM for an additional term. I know things are in good hands with Gerry heading up the BCLA Board and Jill as the Executive Director working together with the balance of the BCLA Board and Staff.

In reviewing the Board Reports from the 2022 AGM for this report it struck me how last year things were just returning to somewhat normal after the pandemic. 2023 could be said to be the first full year of there being normal field and box seasons with league play, community tournaments and travel tournaments.

With the success of the 2022 Summer Games Box Gold and multiple 2022 Field Nationals Golds we were pleased to be able to launch a Nationals Championship Ring Program and hope to see many more BC players earning these in the future.

For the Team BC Field and Box Program 2023 was a Summer of Silvers, which was not the results the teams set out to achieve, nonetheless, a result that BC athletes and coaches should be proud of. *A special congratulations to the U19 Female Field Team on Jenny Kyle Cup National Championship and the U15 Female Field Team as finalists and also the U13 Female Box Team for winning Box Nationals Gold!*

I will leave the details and results at the team level and the thank you's to Mitch Cavallarin (TBC Field Coordinator) and Darcy Rhodes (TBC Box Coordinator) in their reports. I appreciate the work and organization both Darcy and Mitch (and the BCLA office staff) put into the Team BC program - with all the Coaches, Managers and other volunteers it takes an army to get teams to tournaments and much of it goes unnoticed - so thank you it's valued and appreciated work you do.

I will be providing a comprehensive transition report to the BCLA Board and Executive Director in summary it touches on: Much work to be done to continue to advance the TBC program as a high performance program and to develop teams to be able to consistently compete and win Championships at a Nationals Level. This includes all aspects of the physical and mental game and technical and tactical skills and knowledge. TBC Field has been developing players for a longer overall season and the goal is for box to also have a longer team development window as well which is a positive step. To make a quantum leap it will require a rethink and redesign of the current legacy program (TBC Directive), which includes providing funding, increasing resources and staff time while improving organizational performance and lowering barriers for athletes and coaches to participate and develop within the program. Improving communication within the program to leverage common resources and strengths vs competing for athletes and time and money is critical. It also requires improved communication and coordination within community lacrosse through to the local associations, teams, players and parents. A key goal should be to eventually see consistent National Championships for BC with more players earning scholarships and to see more BC players representing Canada on the International stage which optimistically includes the Olympics!

There are many challenges facing lacrosse in BC whether that be at the community or high performance level and I hope to see more consistency, transparency, growth and effort of the entire BC lacrosse community working together to achieve results that in particular bring and keep more youth participating in this fantastic sport and that there continues to be a healthy and growing community of lacrosse families.

This year started with some introductions and development in Box Lacrosse to a couple of new possible Associations looking to have teams play within BC in the upcoming 2023 Box Season. The Princeton Association, through Jamie Graham, is still moving their Recreation League forward. This program, which is comprised mainly of minor Lacrosse players with a few Senior players started in 2022 and several new players have joined in the program to date. Jamie stated that they were able to set up a drop-in schedule for the months of May and June. Hope to see Princeton continue to grow and hopefully start up a Minor Lacrosse program. Was very excited to hear that the Sunshine Coast Minor Association was training new coaches as well as looking to start up new teams. We set up a Level 1 Box Community Development course for the Sunshine Coast, which was held in Sechelt. The course was set up for minor coaches so that they could support the new teams comprised mostly of brand-new players to the sport of Box Lacrosse. We are still in discussion with the association, talking about what would be required for equipment, what type facilities they had, when we could possibly hold a general introduction to the sport, Coaching Clinics and possibly referee clinics. Hopefully we can move this forward and get the Association running a team in every division of Minor Lacrosse however travel to and from the Sunshine Coast is always an issue especially when dealing with getting Officials to their facilities. I was also in contact with a possible new program/team starting up in Masters Box Lacrosse in the Victoria area as well. They are planning to set up a full Recreation drop-in program and possibly expand to some Masters Teams. Victoria is also interested in attending some of the Lower Mainland Masters Tournaments in 2024 and possible travel to out of province tournaments.

The Masters Box Tournament, which is held on the first long weekend in July was cancelled again due to a majority of the players travelling to San Diego to take part in the World Field Championships. The World Field Championships held a

Jamboree event for 35+ players and 45+ players which many local players attended and played in. Will be pushing to have the July Long Weekend Tournament up and going again in the 2024 season, as many Masters are very keen on participating in this tournament. We saw several independent tournaments show up in 2024 such as the N. Shore Tournament in July and the annual Ice Breaker tournament which was held in April.

The Masters Field Program held in Port Coquitlam at Gates Park was able to have a full season this year under modified rules. The season started in April this year and finished up in late September. Congratulations to Team Blue who won the Championship game this year in a very exciting game against Team Red. There were 8 teams participating in the season with roughly 18 players per team. The teams played every weekend from the start of April right through to its completion in Sept. Congratulations to all players who participated and especially to the Masters Field Executive who were able to put together a full season.

The Masters Box Season had a very successful season. The League started in October 2022 and ran through to Feb. 2023. The League was again held at the Field House at the LEC as they were able to secure floor time for the full season. A couple of games had to be played on odd nights, but a great season was had by all participants. Each team had 18 players on their roster and were able to play a full season of 15 games. This year we saw Team Yellow win the Championship. This upcoming season the League expects to have 6 teams again and as always they welcome all interested players over the age of 35 to apply. No previous Box Lacrosse experience is required to play.

It was much better year for everyone involved in the Sport of Lacrosse in 2023 and with the great determination and perseverance of all the great people, volunteers and Associations that we have in Lacrosse the sport rebounded to full league play in all disciplines. I am confident that we will be back on the floor and/or field with no restrictions again in the 2024 Season.

In closing I would like to thank our New Executive Director, Jill Krop, for all her dedication and help through these very exciting times. Jill has done an outstanding job and has stepped up to all the challenges that this season has brought forward. I would also like to thank Deb, Dave, and our new Marketing and Communications Director Shannon Andres, for their continued help in

supporting me in the many aspects of getting the game of Lacrosse promoted and supported throughout the province of BC.

## **British Columbia Lacrosse Association, VP Technical Programs Report**

Our problems with the shortage, retention and recruitment of referees have not been resolved; nor has the abuse of officials improved. Many games during the box season had to be rescheduled or in some cases the games were cancelled. This shortage of officials has to be improved as these situations will cause our sport to suffer.

We cannot guarantee games if we do not have larger base of referees at all levels. All associations need to get more involved with the referee dilemma that we are facing once again. One long time official told me that they are in 'crisis mode' in regard to the shortage of officials across BC. We are not the only sporting organization that has struggled with this problem post Covid but we must all work together to find solutions to alleviate this problem.

We continue to try and recruit in all areas of the game; clinicians, coaches, referees and volunteers are necessary. We need a united effort to increase our official's status and explore all avenues of support to improve this problem.

Thank you to Andy Watson for serving as Chair of Officials this term and dealing with the many problems associated with operating all leagues short staffed.

A special thank you to everyone at the BCLA office for their hard work and problem solving skills on our behalf throughout the season.

Thank you to all who served on Directorates and Technical Groups, Commissions and Leagues as you oversaw the governance, organization and opportunities for athletes at the various levels of Senior and Minor Box, and Men's and Women's Field Lacrosse in BC. And thank you to the BCLA staff, Debbie Heard (Business Manager), Dave Showers (Technical Director) and new addition Shannon Andres (Marketing & Communications, these people show up more than 5 days a week, to keep the wheels turning! As for the registration process, Corinne Perriman (Minor Box/Field Lacrosse) and Judy Regier (Senior Box) – thank you for all your patience, your guidance and for the ongoing work that you do on behalf of our members!

#### **BCLA Provincial Leadership Group**

Field and Box Provincials were both incredibly endeavours this past year. Events were held in the Lower Mainland, in the Fraser Valley and on Vancouver Island. Unfortunately, winter weather impacted the U15 Women's Field medal game schedule, but that was the only hiccup!

Thank you to all the members of Directorate and Technical Support Groups who step up and oversee these Provincial Events. It is no small task to ensure the rules are followed both on and off the field/floor. Thank you for your willingness to give up your vacation and/or spare time in these leadership positions.

Dean Whitson is our promotions partner for both Box and Field Provincials; designing and providing the games' logo along with the swag that athletes and their families purchase. The BCLA is the recipient of a portion of the sales. As we prepare for the 2023/24 Field Provincials we are working in conjunction with Dean and Indigenous artist Lou-ann Neel to create a new logo for this season's Field Provincials.

### **The Vancouver Warriors**

The 2023 season saw growth in the relationship between the BCLA and Warriors. We continued to coordinate in-game display promotions, promoting all lacrosse activities and Wheelchair Lacrosse. The Warriors contributed a portion of their 2022-23 game 50-50 sales to the Warriors-BCLA Lacrosse on the Move Travel Fund. The grant assisted teams traveling to Box and Field Provincials.

In the New Year we are embarking on an enhanced in-school program with the Warriors. Using curriculum created by Team BC Field Coordinator, Mitch Cavallarin, Warriors players will spend time in pe classes teaching students the history and basics of lacrosse. We received a \$50,000 grant from Canadian Tire's Jumpstart to purchase lacrosse sticks and balls, that we will leave behind in the schools for PE teachers to use.

### **I-SPARC – Indigenous Sport, Physical Activity and Recreation Council**

We didn't offer any programming because of the delayed lifting of Covid protocols in many communities. Our 2023/24 goal is to return and deliver our SPIRIT LACROSSE program, improve on our success and grow this program.

### **BC Sport Participation Program (BCSPP) – BC Wheelchair Lacrosse Program**

We resumed limited sessions of the BC Wheelchair Lacrosse Program last year. Details are in Dave's Technical Director Report. BCSPP wheelchair program is a bi-lateral funding agreement between the Government of Canada, the Province of BC and the BCLA, and was administered through viaSport BC. We have 12 sport wheelchairs and a trailer to move the chairs for introductory sessions for future programs in various communities around BC.

### **Canuck Autism Network**

The Canucks Autism Network's Annual Sports Day Camp was held at BC Place on Sunday, June 18, 2023. More than 3,000 individuals participated in the various

sporting activities. The BCLA and Vancouver Warriors team up to help teach lacrosse to the participants of this special day. Thank-you Dave Showers for your dedication to this program.

2023 has been an amazing year for lacrosse coaches and officials in British Columbia. Whether it was in Maple Ridge, Surrey, Burnaby, New Westminster, Cowichan Valley, Saanich, Victoria and Mission for the Provincial Games or in local arenas and fields around the province, I would like to thank every volunteer, coach and official for working so hard to help get the athletes back into the arenas and onto the fields playing our sport.

In this report, I have highlighted the successes and activities that the BC Lacrosse Officials' Technical Support Group (BCLOTSG) and the BC Lacrosse Coaches' Technical Support Group (BCLCTSG) had in the last year, along with our various programs and statistics.

I have so many people to thank for their efforts, hard work and dedication to the sport of lacrosse. Without these people and all our amazing volunteers, we would not be an Association. They are listed in my Coaches and Officials Special Sessions write-ups.

### **Officials Training Statistics:**

In this report I have gathered data from September 2022 to April 2023. My role with the BCLOTG includes the co-ordination of the clinics and preparation of resource material.

---

### **BOX**

The BCLOTG offered **65** In-Person clinics and **3** Zoom Sessions across B.C in 2023, with a total of **781** referees being trained and re-trained.

Entry Level = **248** attended.

Level 1 = **240** attended.

Level 2 = **220** attended.

Level 3-5 = **73** attended.

### **FIELD**

The BCLOTG offered **18** clinics across B.C. in 2022; with a total of **164** overall participants.

FL1 = **104** attended.

FL2 = **28** attended.

FL3-5 = **32** attended.

### **WOMEN'S FIELD**

The BCLOTG offered **9** Umpire clinics in 2022; with a total of **66** participants.

**Total Number of Clinics 95 - Officials attending these clinics: 1,011**

## Coaching Training Statistics:

**Online Coaching Program-** Going into the fifteenth year of the program, we have seen the number of registered Coaches in the program grow to **7,345** participants. For training purposes this program allows coaches to login and complete their pre-clinic assessment, search and register for nearby coaching clinics. Current Coaches, with training, can still register for the online programs and take advantage of the practice planners, videos, drill library etc. All information can be found on the BCLA website.

## COACHING CLINIC RECAPS

### FIELD

The BCLCTG offered **16** In-Person coaching clinics from September 2022 to January 2023. There were **7** FCMD clinics (Field Community Development – Level 1), **4** FCPI (Field Competitive Introduction – Level 2), **3** WFCMD clinic (Women’s Field Community Development – Level 1) and our first WFCPI clinic (Women’s Field Competitive Introduction).

The total number of participants was **226**:

- FCMD – 130** attended (13 No Shows)
- FCPI – 44** attended (34 No Shows\*\*)
- WFCMD – 42** attended (11 No Shows)
- WFCPI – 10** attendees

### BOX

The BCLCTG offered **49** box coaching clinics from November 2022 – July 2023 (16 more than last season). We ran **31** CMD Clinics (Community Development – Level 1), **18** CPI Clinics (Competitive Introduction – Level 2). The total number of participants was **758**:

- **CMD – 515** attended (89 No Shows) – 143 more than last season.
- **CPI – 243** attended (32 No Shows) – 64 more than last season

**Our maximum clinic size in 30 for CMD and 25 for CPI, so we had to have waitlists for over half our clinics. Unfortunately we had 179 coaches’ sign up for clinics and not attend. So those on the waitlist lost out.**

---

**Provincial Championships** – The Field Provincial Championships were held in Maple Ridge, Surrey, New Westminster and Burnaby; the Box Provincial Championships were held in Maple Ridge, Cowichan Valley, Saanich, Victoria and Mission. I was fortunate to be able to attend the majority of them and was amazed by the dedication, long hours and professionalism of all the volunteers I was able to work with. From the hospitality, venues and overall organization, these provincials were top-notch.

**Canucks Autism Network** – The BCLA teamed up with the Vancouver Warriors once again to introduce our amazing sport at the Canucks Autism Network’s Day Camp at BC Place on Sunday, June 18<sup>th</sup>. I, along with five Vancouver Warriors players were joined by Junior athletes Tiana Bikic and Elizabeth Sinow (Ridge Meadows/Team BC). Four stations were set-up to help introduce the four main skills of lacrosse, with some fun games in-between. We are also able to introduce Wheelchair Lacrosse with the thanks of BC Wheelchair Basketball.

**SPIRIT of Lacrosse Program** – The SPIRIT program was put on hold this year, due to the restructuring of the BCLA Office, but we are in discussions with I-SPARC to start again in April. The goal of this program is to develop on-going lacrosse programs within Indigenous communities and create opportunities to build relationships between the Indigenous communities and the local community lacrosse associations. The program is open to all youth of Indigenous descent. We offer 6-10 SPIRIT Lacrosse sessions designed for youth ages 5-12 at no cost to the participants. All equipment is provided for the use of the participants. Participants who completed the program will receive a SPIRIT of Lacrosse t-shirt.

**BC Wheelchair Lacrosse** – Hopefully 2023 will shine a bright light on us and allow us to once again offer this program. I am saving and working on finding a vehicle that will be able to tow the wheelchair trailer (which I do not have). I was fortunate enough to run two sessions so far in 2023. Once during Coquitlam’s Abilities week and the other during the BC Wheelchair Sports Camp. When the last of the provincial championships is completed, that is the end of our 2023 box lacrosse season. I will admit to having a goofy grin on my face for a few days when the season is over. In looking back, I see some positive change in the female games and leagues. Having an interlocking league schedule between the lower mainland and Vancouver Island will help grow and develop the Island female program. The lower mainland teams have been helpful in making this work. We may see some rule changes from Lacrosse Canada (discussed, but not ratified yet) that will reduce off ball contact in all divisions. This may help get more non-lacrosse families to take up box lacrosse, particularly at the younger ages. Our challenges continue to be the behaviour of our coaches and parents. For the coaches, it is their continued inability to control their emotions on the bench and abuse officials. For the parents, it is the use of social media to get attention and in a small number of cases to abuse and berate the association executives. We have worked with associations to assist them with options in dealing with abusive families/parents. The coach's association provides strong leadership and consequences for coaches that go over the line, but the lessons seem slow to stick.

We had another successful run of provincial championships in 2023. There were 4 provincial championships hosted on 3 weekends in July. We made some date changes to accommodate the NAIG in Halifax, which led to a weekend off rather than 3 consecutive weekends as we have done in the past. Our provincial championship hosts did a wonderful job, and we thank them very much for stepping up and allowing us to put on the provincials. It was good to see updated banners, championship plaques and the bucket hats for player of the game winners (something different)

We are thrilled for a return to an in-person AGM to be held in Whistler in 2023. We hear across the province of the challenge in getting and keeping volunteers. We hear from all zones how important it has been in the past and is as important now to recognize and reward our volunteers. Our annual AGM in Whistler is a good way to do this, and we are very pleased that it is back!

There are 19 people (17 now, as we have 2 zone rep vacancies) that make up the Minor Directorate and I thank each one of them for their time and dedication to lacrosse in BC. They have been a patient and supportive group to work with and always have a view to what is best for lacrosse in the province, not just their league, zone, or commission. **BCLCTG Chair Report**  
**August 25, 2023**

With COVID in the rear-view mirror, the 2023 year was a true return to normal for lacrosse in BC and Canada. We have had our challenges and the lingering effects of a very odd two years because of the uncertainty. I think this coaching groups focus needs to now evolve from a stagnant board to a more dynamic organization. Although part of our role is to ensure we monitor and train coaches we need to add value and enrich our coaches in the province. I think our province rests its laurels on its history and takes for granted that our past players will be good coaches but in fact we need to tool these experienced players with coaching strategies and techniques that will assist them in becoming the best coaches in our country.

1. We need to engage online coaching processes that allow more efficient Online coaching was something we had to implement in 2021 for COVID. We have moved away from this model but it needs to be revisited. We need to make the training more accessible, without watering this down. Unfortunately, the theme of the CLA office being unsupportive and non-existent at the grassroots is common in our sector. This may change with the new coaching manual.
2. Our group assisted in spearheading online PD coaching sessions. We need more BC influence and assistance in this March program. We will be running this again, I think BC should assist in building this excellent PD opportunity.
3. Referee Issues: The referee abuse this year was not good, and we are paying a heavy price. Coaches are too emotional invested in their games, they are not able to disconnect and it's a problem and we need to develop some strategies now, or we will continue to have an issue with playing the game.
4. There are some significant challenges facing our coaches group still. The main one in BC is we need to develop resources. I have introduced a new structure that will add a resource person to the group to work on PD options.
5. I think this group is somewhat stale in some ways and Ill take responsibility for that. I also believe not having an in person AGM has hurt us. I am going to take some steps at this AGM to push that we need more education on down from this group.

I cannot be at the meeting as Im at the NLL draft for the Albany Firewolves as we have the first pick in the draft. I sincerely apologize for that and thank everyone for covering for me. I will be pushing at the AGM to make our group more relevant and to address the coach-referee issues to see if we can come up with some solutions. I do think coaching resources are required at all levels, and our new manuals need to be responsive.

## **2023 Year-End Report from Chair of Officiating, BC Lacrosse Officials Technical Support Group**

Hello lacrosse family,

In my second, and final, year as chair of officiating for the BC Lacrosse Officials Technical Support Group (BCLOTSG), I was again humbled by the amount of work our leadership team puts in each and every year. I want to extend particular thanks to Andrew Corbould, our outgoing Secretary-Treasurer for over a decade, and to Sean Lehman, the outgoing Vice-Chair, Senior Box Lacrosse, for their efforts. I also extend my sincere thanks to Ryan Nose (Vice-Chair, Men's Field), Angie Reid (Vice-Chair, Women's Field), Doug Wright (Director-at-Large), and Dallas Lister (Vice-Chair, Minor Box Lacrosse) for their tireless work in their positions on the BCLOTSG executive. Dallas a new board member took on a number of difficult challenges and we are grateful to have her on board; Angie, Ryan and Doug continue to show leadership and great contributions in their areas.

In our second post-pandemic season, we continued to face challenges around staffing. This is going to become even more critical in the years ahead. A shortage of officials – particularly at the L2 and up level – continues to create challenges for allocators, schedulers, RICs, and organizers from all facets of our game. I'm tremendously proud of the smaller-than-normal group of officials who continue to step up to make sure most games were covered. Speaking with other provinces, I can safely say we managed this challenge with innovation and creative thinking that led to fewer games being cancelled relative to what we saw in other provinces (notably Alberta, Ontario and Quebec).

We have a big opportunity ahead with Sixes as a new sector, and I recommend we start investing significant work in this area to help maximize potential participation in this sport. B.C. is well-positioned to be a leader in this area and we will be looking to add a Vice-Chair for Sixes in the year ahead. We also need to consider directors at large in communications and engagement, training and education, and recruitment.

Further, we have a major gap in our recruitment of Indigenous officials in the Creator's Game; we're also lacking female representation in the officiating sector, relative to the number of players and coaches we have representing women in our sport. A concerted effort must be made to create opportunities for female and Indigenous officials in our province. We also have regional disparity in our high-performance program with a higher proportion of officials in urban areas compared to rural parts of the province. All of these must be addressed in future seasons.

We continue to need a long-term solution for referee recruitment and retention. Abuse continues to plague our indoor game, and we also face a labour-market challenge in retaining officials who are lured away by jobs with higher pay, less abuse and more flexibility in hours. We will be proposing some long-term solutions focussed on ongoing improvements to pay, travel (gas prices were a major deterrent for travel for many officials this past box season), and accountability for abusive coaches at the upcoming AGM.



So, while referees are the only people in the sport receiving compensation, this is consistent with what we see in other sports; however, lacrosse officials continue to fall behind what we see in other indoor contact sports and we need to do a full review and adjust to match what we see elsewhere and build in increases to remain competitive.

Once again, we were faced with challenges around delivery of clinics with facilities limiting access for outside parties – working with the office staff we were able to offer hybrid learning opportunities. It is our belief in B.C. that we need to look to a year-round learning opportunities moving forward.

Specific to field lacrosse, in both women's and men's sectors, there seems to be some great progress national on online training which can be supplemented with on-field instruction; in B.C. for box lacrosse, we added an on-floor component in minor lacrosse training which should be the model moving forward (and when we get to rolling out Sixes training, the same approach should be adopted).

On the minor box lacrosse side, there is also a need to consider a graduation / transition program of top officials from minor into senior lacrosse. A regional approach (similar to Ontario's Qualifier program) should be considered between Western provinces (B.C, Alberta and Saskatchewan, possibly Manitoba) and venues could rotate (B.C. in Year 1, Alberta in Year 2, Saskatchewan in Year 3) at major tournaments (think the Wingrove) – you could include three-ref mechanics here and on-floor sessions leading into the events. I believe this is crucial to long-term recruitment and retention and I'll be putting a funding proposal together for discussion at the AGM in the recruitment/retention session.

I'm proud of our representation of officials at the national level. I'd like to publicly acknowledge our officials for national, international and major events since September of 2022:

- **BOX LACROSSE:** Mann Cup – Nick Thomas, Cameron Anderson and Craig Baldrige; Minto Cup – Cam Comeau; Presidents Cup – Jacoby Krassman; Founders Cup – Nico Beaudoin, Vince Burelle, Nathan Chiasson, Zach Jones and Ryan White (Andy Watson RIC); MacDonald Cup – Ben Agnes, Josh Beauregard, Nathan Chiasson, Nicholas dos Santos, Curtis Guildford, Matt Newlove and Jason Syrotuck (Riley Lo RIC); Minor Box Lacrosse Nationals – Kevin Boettger, Sarah Dmytruk, Kody George, Matt Justason, Spencer Pollock and Garrett Watson.
- **WOMEN'S FIELD LACROSSE:** U19 Women's Nationals – Charlie Jones and Angie Reid.
- **MEN'S FIELD LACROSSE:** World Men's Championships (San Diego) – Lee Brien, Ryan Nose, Nico Beaudoin; U15/U18 Men's Nationals – Nathan Chiasson, Nicholas dos Santos and Wes Tyre (Ryan Nose assessor).

As we shift into the next season with field clinics now scheduled, we must continue to focus on these on six areas as an executive team:



- Retention of officials: pay, travel and recognition will be focal points; we have developed a recruitment and retention plan to support this for minor clubs.
- Recruitment of new officials: in particular, how do we recruit adults; per above, we have developed a recruitment and retention plan that will help to support this work.
  - In particular, as noted above, we lack female and Indigenous officials, and we are relying too much on major urban areas for referees at tournaments. A focal point must be rural development and funding those in remote regions of the province to come to tournaments to help grow and develop their craft.
- Year-round education: focus on influencing at the national level on training, educational and information resources; enhancing our clinic for L3-5 referees in indoor/outdoor lacrosse.
- Centralized provincial assigning: while the rollout of Arbiter in minor and senior box lacrosse for most of the province hit some speed bumps, overall the benefits were clearly realized. Further evaluation of a provincewide assigning system – ideally for all sectors of the sport – will help with ensuring games are covered and not cancelled; however, lessons learned from the rollout of Arbiter are that better communication and onboarding are required.
- Professional development opportunities: looking for year-round engagement of officials – this includes building relationships with non-BCLA leagues to allow for long-term officials development opportunities.
- Recognition/Communication: in support of the four points above, how do we meaningfully recognize the efforts of our officials and volunteers; enhance the use of communications channels (digital and traditional) to promote the officiating sector; ensure the transparency of opportunities for officials to grow and develop in all sectors. This is an area where I will be leaning in as past-chair.

A special thanks to Deb, Dave, Matt and Jill at the BCLA Office – we are incredibly grateful for the support and coordination from our PSO team.

I'm looking forward to seeing some new ideas and momentum come to fruition for the 2023-24 lacrosse season and working in my role as past chair with the various sectors to help grow our game, address gaps, and find solutions to the challenges we have faced in recent years.

I am confident in the leadership group that will be in place to continue to move things forward. In particular, since taking on this role, I'd like to thank Doug Wright for his advice, patience, guidance and candor serving as a very trusted director at large, and to former Vice-Chair, Minor, Wilson Louie for his mentorship.
